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#### Where We Started



The Oak Community School was founded by parents of children with intellectual and developmental delays.



As clients aged their need for services changed, Oak Community School merged with a similar organization and became Oak-Leyden.



Oak-Leyden expanded its services to include early intervention and therapy for children with developmental disabilities and delays.



In the 1980s Oak-Leyden open its first Community Integrated Living Arrangement (CILA) to provide residential services to adults.

#### Always meeting the need

Throughout these first 30 years, Oak-Leyden Developmental Services established itself as a caring and uniquely qualified organization that provides a wide range of vocational and residential services for adults with developmental disabilities, as well as comprehensive therapeutic, educational, and family support services for infants and young children.



#### Growing in the community

Over the last 35 years, Oak-Leyden has continued to grow to meet the needs of our participants, families, and the community. Oak-Leyden established itself as a leader in the field, grew the community living services, expanded therapy services to children over 3 years old, and spread day programs into more communities.



#### Where We Are



The Supported Employment Program was created to ensure that people with I/DD are individually supported to obtain and hold jobs in the community.



The Multidisciplinary Clinic was opened in direct response to one of the largest service gaps existing for people with developmental disabilities: adequate healthcare.



Oak-Leyden grew to 12 CILA homes for 54 residents to live in comfort and safety in Chicago's near west suburbs.



Renovations were completed at two Lifelong Living Centers where adults with I/DD enjoy continuing education, clubs, and social activities in Elmwood Park and Oak Park.

Complete Phase 1 of space utilization enhancements and build out of the current and new buildings and homes.

#### Grow with us

The demand for developmental disability services in Cook County far exceeds capacity, leaving around 10,000 adults and children waiting for care. Over the next three years, Oak Leyden will increase the number of people it serves by 67% to 1,000 people per year. Join us as we continue to meet the needs of families and individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and delays.



## Oak Leyden's Programs

CHILDREN'S SERVICES provides tailored therapy to children who have developmental disabilities and/or delays. Services take a unique, multi-disciplinary team approach involving collaboration among developmental, physical, speech-language, behavioral, and occupational therapists to facilitate the holistic development of the child.

COMMUNITY LIVING SERVICES operates twelve residential community homes known as CILAs for 54 residents. Adult participants enjoy comfort and safety in group homes located in Chicago's near-west suburbs. Residents are provided 24-hour support and care that promote personal independence and physical well-being.

LIFELONG LEARNING provides specialized day programs at its day centers for about 120 adults with I/DD who reside in Chicago and the near-west suburbs. Programs focus on skill development, personal interests, supported employment, and community engagement.




